


The Ethics Machine: Six Gazes of the Camera

JAPAN / 1987 / Japanese / 16mm / 122 min / Dir: Hara Kazuo When veteran Okuzaki Kenzo "interviews" his old comrades in arms, he simply beats the real story out of them. Hara's films all skirt the ethical boundaries of conventional documentary.

Dir: Zhao Liang [Part 1: The Masses (104 min), Part 2: Mother and Daughter (111 min), Part 3: Beijing South Railway Station (100 min)]

People from far reaches of China travel to Beijing to petition the seat of power, dodging thugs to appeal their cases. This astounding Director's Cut reveals mass injustice while risking danger to filmmaker and his subjects.
